In what was an unprecedented year in so many ways, Centreville Bank and the Centreville Bank Charitable Foundation continued to display the commitment to charitable giving and community investment that has come to define our organization since its founding in 1828.

Recognizing that the needs of our communities and many nonprofits shifted significantly during the year, the Bank's grant-making processes were realigned to provide support where it was needed most as community-based organizations became the immediate source of basic needs distribution across the region.

We invest in programs that work to increase the stability for low-income individuals and families through wrap-around programs. Specifically in the following areas:




- Adult education, workforce development, GED completion

# COVID-19 Response

In addition to funding for local food pantries and organizations working directly with families impacted by the pandemic, grants were also provided to **Care New England** (expansion of telemedicine programs), **Clínica Esperanza** (additional site staffing to expand testing and support in multi-lingual communities), the **Community Foundation of Northeast Connecticut**, and the **United Way of RI COVID-19 Emergency Fund**.

Over \$256,500 was contributed to 26 organizations (\$103,000 for the COVID-19 Relief Fund, \$94,500 for food and basic needs, and \$59,000 for telemedicine and expanded testing access).
